The Console Wars

With the holiday season finished and the dust finally settling over the Best Buys and Wal-Marts of America, the release of the two newest gaming consoles, Microsoft's "X-Box One" and Sony's "Playstation 4," still proves to divide and incite debate from the gaming community. Some gaming enthusiasts argue that the two consoles can't be compared, as they offer very different gaming experiences, while others argue that the two consoles can be contrasted quite easily. This contrast will yield different comparisons from consumers, of course, but some lessons are clearly learned from the success and competitive atmosphere from the gaming industry's history.

The overall economic impressions felt from the two releases, as well as the boosted sales from Nintendo's "Wii U" proves the growing value of this business. Some analysts predict that the gaming industry will be worth nearly \$83 billion by 2016. This is, of course, not just due to large and growing console playing consumers, but also through online and mobile game's exploding growth (Chapple). This industry has expanded and changed over 40 years and impacted nearly every home in America.

Over time, this growing business has proven to diversify the avenues through which consumers buy and play video games. It has also proven to intensify the competitive nature of a console's release, as many gamers only buy one console when released, if any at all.

As a consumer, it is getting harder and harder to determine which is the clear winner of the console wars. Some things

to consider when determining which is the better out of the two systems is the technology that each utilizes and offers to the gaming experience, as many of the upcoming titles will be released on both the X-Box and PS4.

The system's hardware is very similar. Both of the consoles host 8 Gb of Ram and 500 Gb of hard drive space. The two offer similar processors, HDMI outlets, can play Blu-Ray discs, and both require paid subscriptions to X-Box Live and Playstation Plus (respectively) for online multiplayer modes.

However, the X-Box One does seem to boast some additional features, including: WiFi-Direct, an HDMI input, and the motion sensory technology, X-Box Kinect. The X-Box One also requires a daily Internet connection to function. The trade-off however, is the price difference: as the X-Box One is \$500, while the PS4 is \$400 (Hatmaker).

The gaming landscape is changing. Some consumers will not buy any of the new consoles. Some will buy all three. These consoles embody the competition that the industry has to overcome. With that in mind, it is important to know that whoever wins the console wars, it is a temporary victory because there are sure to be more battles to come.




Win or lose, the Warhawks have made AUM proud and looked forward to future seasons. If you're around campus and see a player, make sure to thank them on a great season!
