AUM's Curtis Leads Charge for another NAIA National Championship

Being considered a winner for an athlete is the highest honor awarded. Competing and succeeding at the top level is necessary in order to grade an athlete's ability. AUM's Women's Tennis team has been tested before and showed the country that they are a legitimate title contender.

AUM won the NAIA National Championship this past season in Mobile, Ala., only having to win five team matches. The team consisted of Jade Curtis, Morgane Zowczak, Hagar Caro, Chanel Cunningham, Maria Vargas and Tiffany Williams.

The future looks brighter than ever, but what's the key for success in this upcoming season?

Jade Curtis, 23, from Saltash, England, has experience winning national championships before. She has totaled three in her career and believes that even with a new, younger team she can bring another championship back home. "We have a new group of girls this year," Curtis said. "But all of us have connected so well, and I believe that our chances are good this year."

Winning has become custom for AUM's tennis program, and expectations have been greatly raised. Coach Rolando Vargas's success hasn't been unnoticed by the community and must be highlighted. "Coach Vargas just wants all of us to be successful and work hard, so that our chances multiply for

During her career, Curtis has racked up a 65-2 singles record, and finished 21-0 as the top women's singles player. She was named to the Collegiate Tennis Association's 2013 Collegiate All-Star Team along with AUM's Nicolas Pinones-Haltenhoff.

She just finished up her second straight undefeated season in singles, and currently has a 60 consecutive match streak going. Everything looks promising for another championship run, so look for the Warhawks to compete this season.

The first one is located at the heart of Montgomery's Lagoon Park and is quite a challenge. Lagoon Park provides an exciting golf experience for both beginners and more advanced players. Lagoon Park is ranked among the Top 100 Public Golf Courses in Alabama by Golf Digest. If you are a student and you are looking to save money but still want to go and play golf, Lagoon Park has a great deal. The rate after 2 p.m. is \$29.99 with a golf cart. Compare it to every other quality golf course in Europe, and you would have to multiply this number by 2.5 at least.

The second golf course within our area is Tallapoosa Lakes Golf Course. It's a 36-hole public

golf course, where you can test your ability almost at every hole. The fact that you can choose between two different courses (east & west) gives you a new challenge every time. Tallapoosa Lakes Golf Course also offers a great deal after 2 p.m. for only \$20, 18 holes and a golf cart.

Both of these courses are an amazing challenge and experience for those of you who want to play golf affordably. There are many courses here within the area, but not many public ones like Tallapoosa and Lagoon Park.



The Assassination of President John F. Kennedy—50 Years Later

It has been 50 years since one of the darkest hours in our nation's history. President John F. Kennedy was assassinated on Nov. 22, 1963, in Dallas, Texas. The United States was modernizing, and tensions with the Soviet Union and Cuba were high.

Kennedy was in Texas to gather support for the 1964 presidential election. While the motorcade traveled through Dealey Plaza. The gunman, Lee Harvey Oswald, was positioned in a Texas schoolbook depository building; he was ready to take the shot that would change the country. Hundreds of people were around watching and waiting for the President and First Lady, Jacqueline Kennedy's brief drive-by appearance. No one was prepared for what was to come. Three shots were fired with the last fatal bullet striking the President in the head.

As it often happens for such dramatic, history-changing events, anyone who was alive, young and old remembers where she or he was on that day. Dr. Timothy Henderson, Professor and history department chair here at AUM, remembers that fateful day. He was in Charlotte, N. C., coming home from school when he heard the crossing guard say that Kennedy had been shot. "People were pretty much glued to their television for a while," Henderson said.

What was to follow this tragic event would leave the United States in a state of uncertainty. There were conspiracy talks of Cuban, Russian and even Mexican involvement. An investigation concluded that Oswald acted alone; however, even 50 years later, President Kennedy's assassination is a focal point of movies and books. However, there are still more questions than answers. What we do know is that Kennedy left a permanent impact on our nation's history with the Cuban Missile Crisis, supporting the Civil Rights Movement and encouraging the space race.

Kennedy once said, "Ask not what your country can do for you - ask what you can do for your country." Years later, this statement challenges us to do our patriotic duty for our country. So let's remember President John F. Kennedy on the 50th anniversary of his passing. We can look back at what our country has accomplished post-J.F.K., yet knowing our country's direction was forever altered that fateful day.




