On May 3, the Scott and Zelda Fitzgerald Museum hosted their 20th Annual Gala and Auction, celebrating the 25th anniversary of the world's only museum dedicated to the iconic literary couple. Guests came to the residence on Felder Avenue decked out in 1920s-inspired costumes and masks in honor of the masquerade theme, commemorating the years the Fitzgeralds spent in Paris.

As guests made their way up a cobbled pathway to the museum, their ears were met with the musical arrangements of the The Lo-Fi Loungers, a '20s and '30s jazz band. A large tent covered the yard in front of the museum and served as a gathering place for guests to dance along to the music, dine on a variety of food items and enjoy the company of other guests. Owls, eagles and other exotic birds lined the entrance to the museum, allowing guests to interact with the

birds and their handlers from the Montgomery Zoo. Throughout the evening, guests were allowed and encouraged to explore the museum's extensive collection of memorabilia and relics.

Willie Thompson, executive director of the museum and gala host, welcomed guests to the event and introduced chairman of the board Julian McPhillips, who spoke about the history of the museum and thanked the guests for their attendance and support. The celebrity guest of the evening, author R. Clifton Spargo, spoke to the crowd about his novel, Beautiful Fools. The novel chronicles a trip taken by the Fitzgeralds before Zelda's death. Spargo spent a majority of the night selling and signing books for interested guests inside the museum.

While the gala provides entertainment and fun for guests, it also serves as a fundraiser for the museum. According to Thompson, the museum raised over \$10,000, which will go towards expanding the museum shop and finishing the parking lot. The silent auction was a huge hit, featuring items such as an autographed BB King album, art pieces from several local artists and gift packages from Old Alabama Town, River City Publishing and Doug's 2 Salon. The live auction included many beautiful and expensive pieces of jewelry, but a platinum and black gold diamond ring from Marquirette's Exquisite Jewelry
